To summarize:

Step One:

• Discover our values, interests and skills – we can do this as parents and students together in discussion, or with career counsellors, or online

Step Two:

- Match our values, interests and skills to careers by getting more information about careers:
 - o By discussing with people in these careers
 - By trying them out through volunteer work
 - By searching online
- Explore <u>www.workbc.ca</u> for potential careers
 - Under Jobs and Careers and Explore Careers enter a career title (eg: civil engineering or actor or interior design) Here, we can find out information about a career; compare other careers and watch videos.
 - Be sure to check out the most recent edition of BC's Labour Market Outlook: https://www.workbc.ca/Labour-Market-Industry/Labour-Market-Outlook.aspx
 - For quick access to videos, click on "Career Trek"
- If we are interested in the trades, check out Industry Training Authority of BC's (ITA) website:
 - <u>www.itabc.ca</u> click on youth in trades and find information on possible careers and education routes, apprenticeships, etc.
 - o Interested in trades programs across Canada? Visit: <u>www.careersintrades.ca</u>

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Step Three:

- Explore the training/education needed to have that career at <u>www.educationplannerbc.ca</u> (Let's pick engineering, acting, and interior design)
 - On the homepage in Search by program enter a keyword these pages will give you all the details as to the length, location, costs, prerequisites, etc. required for the training needed to have a career in a certain field.
 - In Plan Under 'People of Post-Secondary', review all the information provided and check out the resources
 - Check out the BC Transfer Guide see how courses transfer throughout the BC system. www.bctransferguide.ca
